Add the Embroidered Patch

Made with Love! Attach the embroidered patch to your scarf. Use your darning needle, and about 18 inches (46 cm) of sewing yarn to secure. Knot the ends and trim any extra yarn.



Twist

Here is another fun technique to try.

1 Lay your scarf flat on your work surface. Weave your tails through the knitting of your scarf using the blue darning needle. Trim any ends as needed.

2 Thread your darning needle with the sewing thread, knot the end to secure.

3 Fold your scarf in half lengthwise, then grab each end as shown in figure 3. The scarf ends should look like 2 letter C's facing each other. -

4 Interlock each fold so all 4 layers are stacked together as shown. Squeeze the folds to keep them secure.

5 Take your darning needle and sew a whip stitch up and over the ends as shown in figure 5. Keep your stitches close together making sure you have captured all 4 layers until you reach the end.

6 When you have finished, securely knot the thread and trim off any extra.

Now turn your project inside out to reveal your fashion twist Cowl!



Washing Instructions - Hand wash your scarf with mild soap and cool water. Rinse and lay flat to dry.

QUICK KNIT >>>> Button Scarf

Age 9+

Knit Your Scarf -

You will be using a technique called the **"Figure 8**" weave. Watching the video will be very helpful for this step: Youtube.com/user/LionBrandYarn or Youtube.com/JustAddImagination

1 Tie your yarn on the anchor peg. leaving a 2 inch (5 cm) tail. You will weave this tail in later.



2 Wrap the yarn around the pegs in a figure 8 pattern as shown until you reach the end of the loom.



3 Once your reach the end you will wrap the last peg a little differently. This will be the only peg with one loop.



4 Continue wrapping the pegs in the opposite direction, tracing the loops with the same figure 8 pattern.



5 When you reach the end, you will have 2 loops on all of the pegs except one. Wrap your working yarn around the anchor peg a



PRO-TIPS

• Ignore the 2 pegs on the short ends of the loom circled below. You won't use them to make your scarf.



• Experiment with the way you hold the loom to find the position that's most comfortable for you.

 As you wrap, keep tension on the varn so it does not slip off the loom.

• As you knit, pull down on the center of your project. This helps tighten your stitches and makes the figure 8 pattern on your loom easier to see.

6 Starting with the last wrapped peg, slide your knitting hook along the groove. Hook the bottom loop and pull it over the top loop and peg as shown. Release the yarn from your hook.

Continue to hook the loops around the entire loom until each peg has only one loop left. Congratulations, you have just knit your first row! Push the yarn down onto the pegs.





Follow step 6, hooking the bottom loops over the top loops. Continue the single wrap and hook process remembering to skip the first peg leaving only one loop.

8 After knitting a few rows, remove the knot and tail from the anchor peg. Pull the piece through the center of the loom. You will use your darning needle to weave that into your piece later.



When you finish the first ball of yarn, tie the end to a new yarn ball with a

small knot. As you continue weaving, you can tuck the knot inside the scarf. To match the yarn color pattern, you may need to trim a few inches from the new ball of yarn to reach the desired color.

9 Continue weaving until you have about 12 inches (31 cm) tail of yarn left.

Casting Off

1 Remove each loop from one side of your loom and place it on the matching peg on the opposite side. Your loom should look like this. \longrightarrow



2 Using your hook, pull the bottom loops up and over each peg leaving one loop on each peg.



your 12 inch (31 cm) tail. Place the second peg loop on the first peg. The first peg will now have 2 loops.

5 Continue down the loom following this pattern until you have cast off the last peg. Take your yarn tail and pull it through the remaining loop. Remove it from the loom, pulling the yarn to tighten.

6 Use the needle threader to thread your darning needle with the remaining yarn and weave it through the bottom of your piece, going in and out of the stitches to hide your tails. Use your scissors to trim any extra yarn.

Add the Heart Buttons -

1 Thread the blue sewing thread through the yellow sewing needle with the needle threader.

2 With your scarf laying flat, position your buttons as shown. \rightarrow

3 Pass the needle and yarn through the button holes 4-5 times until secure. Knot the ends and trim off any excess varn.

4 Push the buttons through the weave on the opposite end of your scarf to secure. Adjust the fit by buttoning closer or further away from the end.



3 Starting at the end opposite of



Use your hook to pull the bottom loop up and over.

4 Take that single loop on the first peg, and move it to the empty second peg. -

Move the loop from peg 3 over to the second peg giving it 2 loops.

Use your hook to pull the bottom loop up and over.







PRO-TIP

One end of your scarf will look looser than the other. Secure the buttons on the looser end. This end will be covered once the scarf is buttoned.
