Using color-coded needles, rainbow self-striping yarn, and these easy to follow step-by-step instructions, you can make your very own pocket scarf while learning how to knit! The skills used in this project are the basis for any other knitting projects!

Learning a new skill takes time and patience. Younger crafters may need a little help and encouragement along the way. Before you begin, review the instructions and pictures carefully. Casting On

To make the Scarf, the first step is to cast 12 stitches onto your green knitting needle. Just follow the steps to cast on:

STEP 1


STEP 5



Find the end of the yarn that's coming from the ball and wrap it around vour thumb and index finger to make a loop. Hold the end of the yarn with your thumb.

STEP 2

Pull the yarn coming from the ball of yarn through the loop.



Gently pull the loop up and the yarn ends down to make a slip knot.



Pull the yarn ends gently to slightly tighten the slip knot.


STEP 6

Insert the point of the green needle into the slip knot, then pull the yarn ends gently again to tighten the knot around the needle. Make sure the knot can still slide easily on the needle! This is your first stitch.

With the purple needle behind the green needle, insert the tip of the purple needle into the stitch you made in Step 5. Gently grip both needles with the thumb and forefinger of one hand.

With your other hand, wrap the working yarn (the yarn that is coming from the ball of yarn) around the purple needle from left to right / back to front to make a loop on the purple needle.


STEP 9




Insert the tip of the areen needle, from the top, into the loop on the purple needle and transfer the loop onto the green needle to make the second stitch.






You now have 2 stitches on the green needle. Give the working yarn a slight, gentle tug to keep the stitches even.

Insert the purple needle into the stitch closest to tip of the green needle.


Repeat Step 9. You now have 3 stitches on the green needle. Give the working yarn a slight, gentle tug.

Start Knitting!

STEP 2

Now you'll be working back and forth in rows across the 12 stitches you cast on. At the start of each new row, hold the needle with the stitches on it in your left hand. Use the needle in your right hand (also called the working needle) to knit the stitches. At the end of a row, all the stitches will be on your right hand needle. Many left-handed people find it easiest to knit right-handed. If you prefer to knit left-handed, the process is simply a mirror image of the same steps.

STEP 1



Insert the purple



Wrap your working yarn around the purple needle from left to right / back to front to make a loop.




Hold the loop in place and use the purple needle to pull the loop through the stitch made in Step 5.



Wrap your working yarn around the purple needle just as you did in Step 7.




Use the tip of the purple needle to pull the yarn you just wrapped through and make a loop on the purple needle just as you did in Step 8.



STEP 3




Hold the loop in place and use the purple needle to pull the loop through the stitch to make a loop on the purple needle.



Keeping the loop on the purple needle, slip the first stitch off the green needle and let it drop.

Knitting Continued



STEP 5

Repeat Steps 1-4 until you have knit all the stitches that were on the purple needle onto the green needle. You've finished the first row!

To begin the second row, move the needle with the stitches on it to your left hand. Hold the empty needle in your right hand.






Insert the tip of the right hand (working) needle into the first stitch on the left hand needle.


Joining a New Ball of Yarn ——

When your ball of yarn has only a few inches (cms) of yarn remaining and you're at the end of a row, you'll need to join a new ball of yarn.

STEP 1



You should join a new ball at the beginning of a row.



To join, just drop the yarn you've been using, then begin knitting with the new ball, leaving a yarn tail a few inches (cms) long*.

Continue knitting until your Scarf is about 56 inches (142 cm) long.



To finish your Scarf, you'll need to bind off the 12 stitches. Just follow the steps to bind off:

STEP 2



Hold the needle with the stitches on it in your left hand and the empty needle in your right hand. Knit the first 2 stitches from the left hand needle onto the right hand needle

STEP 10



Repeat Steps 6-9 until you have knit all the stitches that were on the left hand needle onto the right hand needle. You've finished the second row!

Repeat Steps 6-10 to continue knitting rows.

At the end of every row, move the needle with the stitches on it to your left hand and hold the empty needle in your right hand.

*you may find it easier to work the next few rows by tying the tail of the old yarn and the tail of the new working yarn in a loose knot. Be sure to remove the knot before finishing your scarf.



STEP 3



With the tip of your left hand needle, lift the second stitch on your right hand needle over the first stitch on the right hand needle and then off the right hand needle to bind off the first stitch.

STEP 4



You'll still have one stitch on your right hand needle.

Repeat Step 3 to bind off one stitch.



You'll have one stitch on your right hand needle.



Slip the last stitch off the needle, then pull the end of the yarn through the stitch and tighten.

Make the Pockets

Fold one end of the Scarf up about 5 inches (13 cm) to make the pocket. Cut a piece of yarn about the length of your arm and thread it into the blunt needle using the needle threader as shown to the right.



Bring the threaded needle through the top corner of the pocket, leave a yarn tail about 4 inches (10 cm) long.



Insert your needle through the back and up through the front to form a loop.



Draw your needle through the loop and pull gently, this will make a knot. Pull yarn to tighten the knot.



Sew the edge of the pocket to the Scarf until you reach the bottom corner, then knot the yarn.

Almost Done!

Now you'll hide the ends of yarn at the cast on and bound off ends of the Scarf and at the places where you joined a new ball of yarn.







Trim the yarn end, leaving a 4 inch (10 cm) long yarn tail. Thread the yarn tail into the blunt needle, then draw it inside the pocket to hide it.


In the same way, sew the other side of the pocket to the Scarf, then repeat to make a pocket on the opposite end of the Scarf.



STEP 2



Draw the blunt needle through a stitch at the bottom of the pocket from front to back, drawing up the folded loop of yarn. Slip the blunt needle off the loop.



Pull the yarn ends through the loop.

Add Fringe Continued

STEP 5



Pull yarn ends gently to tighten.

STEP 6



Repeat Steps 2-5 to make 8 more fringes – for a total of 9 fringes across the end of the pocket.



In the same way, make 9 fringes across the other pocket.

STEP 8



Trim the ends of the fringe to make them even,



Made with Love! Attach the embroidered patch to your pocket scarf. Use your darning needle and a piece of leftover yarn to secure. Trim any extra yarn.

Gift Tags Use the tags included to give a handmade gift to someone special.

Washing Instructions:

Hand wash your scarf with mild soap and cool water. Rinse and lay flat to dry.
