

PROBATION

Probation is a period of supervision in the community, usually for a period of 12 to 24 months. It is often used as an alternative to imprisonment for individuals who have committed a crime but whose offense is considered less serious. Probation allows the individual to remain in their home and community while being monitored by a probation officer.
