

PROBATION

Probation is a court-ordered period of supervision for individuals who have been convicted of a crime. It is often used as an alternative to incarceration for first-time offenders or those with minor offenses. The probation officer monitors the individual's behavior and ensures they comply with the terms of their sentence, such as attending counseling, maintaining employment, and staying out of legal trouble. Failure to comply can result in the individual being sent to prison.

Probation is typically granted for a period of 1 to 3 years. During this time, the individual must report to their probation officer regularly and follow all the rules and regulations set forth in their probation agreement. Some common conditions of probation include: maintaining a steady job, staying out of trouble with the law, attending any required counseling or treatment programs, and staying at a specific residence.
