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The Suffix *-ing*

The suffix *-ing* shows continuous action. Verbs end in *-ing* to show the action is continuing.
One-syllable verbs that end in *ie* change to *y* before adding *ing*.

Examples: *learning* means “continuing to learn”

tying means “continuing to tie”

More Rules for the Suffix *-er*

The suffix *-er* is added to an adjective in order to compare two things.

- When a word ends in a vowel + consonant, double the consonant and add *er*.
- When a word ends in a *y*, change the *y* to an *i* and then add *er*.

Examples: *wetter* means “more wet than the other”

uglier means “more ugly than the other”
